

Meeting Reports

DISPLAYS BY BETH & ROSA Tuesday 20 November

Beth took the theme of "Health" for her display which started with Egyptian medicine in 3000 BC. A wide range of health issues were covered, including alcoholism, asthma, drug abuse and smoking. The work of Edward Jenner and the development of inoculation was depicted along with other health pioneers such as Florence Nightingale, Mary Walker the American Civil War army surgeon, Alexander Flemming and Robert Koch. Other topics included hospitals, groups and blood the St John's Ambulance. Diseases such as diabetes, polio and tuberculosis were covered.

The second half of the evening was devoted to Rosa's display on the subject of "Birds". The role of Darwin's finches in the formation of the theory of evolution was used to introduce the subject. This was expanded upon with the theory that birds are descended from dinosaurs. Stamps depicting prehistoric birds, parrots, swans and seabirds were shown. This was followed by a look at the work of the Jersey Wildlife Preservation Trust. Bird stamps from Russia, Falkland Islands and New Zealand made colourful additions to the display.

MY FAVOURITE THEME Monday 3 December

Your editor was forced to miss this meeting due to illness and has been unable to obtain a report from another source.

FESTIVE NIGHT Tuesday 18 December

The annual contest for the Tomex Quiz was set by last year's winner Maggie Thompson. The many different displays from the previous twelve months provided the inspiration for several of the

questions. The editor of this journal came out victorious, although it must be said that he had something of an unfair advantage. Having kept notes of all our meetings he was therefore better placed than most members to recall what had been seen over the past year.

The one sheet competition was won by David Church with an early usage of the Penny Black on a cover dated 12 May 1840.

Thanks must go to all members who contributed to the festive buffet which followed the competitions.

BOHEMIA & MORAVIA Monday 7 January

Members who were absent missed an exceptional display and informative talk on a short lived period in central European history. Tony introduced the display by explaining that he met his wife in Prague and then decided to look for a subject that would remind him of that happy event. After a brief introduction on the creation of Czechoslovakia after World War I, Tony described how the new state was meant to act as a buffer against German military aggression, 1938 was a special year as it marked the twentieth anniversary of the young state, but it also saw civil unrest by ethnic Germans living in the Sudetenland encouraged by Adolph Hitler. Troubled flared up in the September but was suppressed by Czech forces. In response Hitler demanded that the Sudetenland be absorbed into Germany. Chamberlain (Britain) and Deladier (France) refused to Czechs support the despite willingness to fight. In March 1939 Slovakia separated from the remainder of Czechoslovakia and the German protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia was formed. Tony showed a selection of early covers including meter marks and stamps from the first republic. A Zeppelin cover with the first set of Bohemia and

Moravia, overprints in German. advertising covers, personal delivery service, business reply service and were shown. Tony business mail demonstrated how five stamps if laid down in a certain way traced a map of the former Czechoslovakia and illustrated this with a cover that had passed through the postal system without being detained. The assassination of Reinhard Hevdrich by Czech and Slovak nationalists and the terrible reprisals inflicted by the Nazis including the destruction of the villages of Lidice and Lezaky was covered.

THE HOLOCAUST Tuesday 22 January

This difficult subject was sensitively

handled by Ian Nutley when he gave his display to the Society. The introduction included postcards from Germany, Austria and USA amongst depicting anti-Semitism. The role of Herman Göring was illustrated by a cover from IVB4, the Jewish Office, and the emphasis in Germany from 1937 to encourage Jews to emigrate. The major part of the display covered concentration camp mail including the various

regulations covering the different types of prisoner. Apart from Jews, prisoners included gypsies, enemies of the state, communists. trades unionists criminals. The Nazis believed criminal behaviour was genetic and could inherited. Consequently criminal inmates were allowed to regain their freedom if they agreed to be sterilized. The second part of the display showed the extent of the concentration camp system. which covered almost the whole of German occupied Europe. The final part of the display included parcel stamps, forgeries and mail from Auschwitz.

MEMBERS' DISPLAYS, E & F Monday 4 February

Five members provided displays inspired by the letters E and F. Our President Len Stanway opened the evening with a display of *Federated Malay States*. John Cowlin then showed *F for Fighting*, which featured picture postcards from the Boer War. Chris Cooksey provided displays of *Falkland Islands* and *HMS Endurance*. Maggie Thompson showed *Fakes, Forgeries and Facsimiles* and Charlie Mead finished the evening with *Fiji First Day Covers* and *French Polynesia*.

BASILDON v BILLERICAY QUIZ Tuesday 19 February

One of the closest ever contests between the two clubs resulted in a narrow four point victory for the Basildon v Billericay shield. Bob Jackson of Brentwood society set the questions for the evening and proved to be an excellent quizmaster. The Basildon team of Maggie Thompson, David Church and Dave Perry were pitted against Jean Taylor, David Barter and Arthur Ritchin for Billericay. The searching questions brought out the best in both teams and an added twist helped to keep the scores ticking over. If neither team could answer a question it was thrown open to the audience. If it was then answered correctly the points were awarded to the team selected by the person giving the right answer. After two rounds of questions the scores were tied at 14 all. By half time Billericay had the narrowest of leads, a single point separating the teams. At the end of round four the scores were again tied. In the penultimate round Basildon established a five point lead, but a spirited fight back from Billericay reduced this to just four points at the end of an exciting contest. \square

Shaken But Not Stirred

Following the Basildon v Billericay quiz David Church was involved in a car crash at the Basildon Hospital roundabout. A car containing three youths was driving erratically and ran into David's car giving him no chance to avoid an accident. David was shaken, his mother Ivy bruised, but May Coleville suffered a broken rib. May was taken to the hospital while the police drove David and Ivy home. All three are now well on the road to recovery. \square

Fiji WAR STAMP The War Stamp Overprints by Charlie Mead

Fiji issued War Tax stamps as a direct result of similar issues in Canada and result of similar issues in Canada and New Zealand. Postal fees were published in the Royal Gazette on 5 November, 1915.

½d on all postcards posted within Fiji

½d on commercial papers and documents posted in Fiji for delivery in Fiji

1d on all letters posted in Fiji, except letters on which the minimum rate of postage is 2½d

1d on all other articles, except newspapers, posted in Fiji

The then current stamps of the colony were the De La Rue key type, printed on multiple crown CA watermarked paper and perforated comb 14. The halfpenny green and penny red values were overprinted "WAR STAMP" by the Fiji Government Printer, based in the capital, Suva. These overprinted stamps were issued on 1 December 1915.

On 19 May 1916 the London GPO requested 379 specimen copies of the

War Stamps for distribution among the administrations of the Postal Union. 380 copies of each value were overprinted diagonally with a brass stamp reading 'SPECIMEN' which had been ordered from Sydney in 1913. The stamps were sent to London on 10 July 1916.

Revised postal fees were published on 1 December, 1916. The main changes are shown in italics.

½d on all postcards posted within Fiji for delivery in Fiji

½d on commercial papers and documents posted in Fiji for delivery in Fiji

1d on all letters posted in Fiji, except letters on which the minimum rate of postage is 2½d

Id on all parcels posted in Fiji

1d on all other articles, except newspapers, posted in Fiji for delivery in Fiji

One sheet of penny and two sheets of halfpenny stamps are reported to have been issued with the overprint inverted and with the full knowledge of the Post Office. Apparently the error was not thought to be important! Ninety-three years later and the latest emergency surcharges on Fiji's Land Bird definitives can also be found inverted. It appears that the Post Office in Fiji still does not consider it important!


A sheet of penny stamps had the overprint displaced to the left by one full column giving rise to the error of a pair of stamps with only one of them overprinted. Both halfpenny and penny stamps can be found

with the overprint offset on the reverse.

The cover in the illustration bears 4d (2 ×1d and 4 × ½d) in War Stamps. The 4d rate is made up as follows: 1d Empire postage, 1d War Tax and 2d registration fee. The stamps have been cancelled with the single ring GPO Suva date stamp for 25 September 1917. The double ring Suva registered date stamp for the same date has been applied in the bottom right corner. \square

??? DID YOU KNOW ???


The monopoly of the New Zealand Post Office was circumvented ingeniously in 1930-1 by Dominion Airlines Ltd, which operated an air service between Hastings and Gisborne in the North Island. Letters were carried for sixpence each, and the company produced special stamps for the purpose. The Post Office objected to this and ordered the company to terminate the service. The company managed to continue the service, within the letter of the law, by re-issuing the labels without any denomination expressed. Technically the letters were carried free of charge, but had to be signed by the pilot, G B Bolt, who charged sixpence for his autograph. □
