Dennis Livermore brought along a number of the latest "Raflet" magazines that are full of articles about collecting and the story behind some stamps issues members of "Raflet" get 6 magazines a year.

Also on display were books from the library, an update of this accompanies this newsletter.

Did you know that the worlds longest running definitive has been issued in Norway whose Posthorn and Numerals have been in continuous use for the lower values since 1871. In a period spanning 130 years it has undergone a number of changes but still has the same basic design.

Meeting report visit by Maidstone and Mid Kent Philatelic Society.

Three members of that Society visited us in October. Ernie Warden opened the evening with the story of his experiences in Hong Kong. His father a Royal Marine took his discharge there before the war and he himself was born there, and when during the second world war the Japanese advanced near there he was evacuated to Australia. After showing his fathers last ship and discharge paper he when on to display a number of Prisoner of War and Internees censored letterforms some with only 25 words others with 75 or 200 words, the 200 word were short lived because the Japanese could not censor the longer letters. Each of the Japanese censors had up to three "chops" or censor marks. The Japanese and Australian Red Cross were responsible distribution of this mail. A number of the letters shown were from Naval and Marine personal who were interned separately in a camp away from towns. Stanley Prison was used to intern civilians until 1943 when it was changed to a military prison. Virtually all non Asian civilians were interned including one Japanese lady who was married to an English man, the exception was the Portuguese with whom there was no war.

Displayed were some forgeries made by one of these people one with a postmark on a stamp that was made some weeks before the stamp was issued.

The second part of his display was of the history of Hong Kong from 1841 to 1997 and opened with the 1882 issue of Queen Victoria that included some watermark and colour varieties and went on to the 1880 issue with its colour changes, he followed with stamps of each of the Monarchs-

Followed by a series of blocks of stamps including one with misplaced perfs. He completed his display with sets of stamps that showed the way of life in Hong Kong.

Japanese Sea Post was the opening section of John Grants display that had a number of stamps cancelled at the various ports of Japan with a number of covers that originated in Yokohama and were post marked again at the receiving ports one cover had some 8 different marks. Included in this section was a cover sent from Yokohama to Holland via Siberia. The second part of Johns showing was stamps of Manchukuo that included material from the Japanese invasion.

Trevor Wigmore developed the story of the postal history of Newport Monmouthshire, and its various postmarks. Opening with letters from 1788 and 1791 with two line postmarks, next was a letter to Buckingham with a 151 mileage mark. Newport was given the cancellation number 151 and shown were a number of mail coach letters with this number including one from 1829 with a mileage mark.

Letters from early 1840 were followed by a cover with a penny black with a Maltese cross cancel. A number of covers with 1d reds between 1859 and 1865 preceded some prisoner of war covers from German and Italian inmates of camp 184 just outside Newport. The county name was changed to Gwent in 1985 and the display completed with a number of covers from then to the present day. Charlie Mead gave a vote of thanks for a very interesting evening.

The Occupation of the Channel Islands part 3

It had become obvious by October 1940 that the supplies of low value stamps were running short and the Germans said that a supply of local stamps would be needed but said that they must not carry the Kings head or any connection with Great Britain. Mr E W Vaudin the artist of the Guernsey press company was asked to design the stamps, he ignored the directive and used the Arms of the Island knowing that they were also the Royal arms of Edward 1 this was not found out by the Germans. Mr. Charles Toms prepared the printing plates of 30 subjects of the 1d. The stamps were printed in typography by the Guernsey press company on unwatermarked paper. The 1d went on sale on 18 February 1940 (the day bi-sects were discontinued), the 1/2d on 7 April 1940 and the 2 1/2d on 12 April 1944. Some of the 1/2d and 1d were printed on bluish French banknote paper. Jersey's first local stamps were based on the Guernsey stamps by Major Norman Rybot who included in the design of the 1d stamp the letter a in each corner this was later found to be "Ad Avernum Adolf Atrox" translated to to hell with you atrocious Adolf. On the half penny the top corners had A's and the bottom B's meaning Atrocious Adolf and Bloody Benito. These stamps were also printed on un watermarked paper in typography by the Jersey evening post.

Early in 1943 it was decided to issue a set of pictorial stamps and Edmond Blampied a Jersey artist was commissioned-

To design them at £10 per design, six values were required and they were for the 1/2d Jersey old Manor house, 1d Portelet Bay the 1 1/2d Corbiere Lighthouse, the 2d Elizabeth castle, 2 1/2d Mont Orgueil Castle and on the 3d Gathering Seaweed. The Royal cypher of George VI was incorporated on the 3d stamp again in defiance of the German directive. The stamps were engraved by H Cortot and produced at the French Government printing works and issued between 1 June 1943 and 22 February 1944.

The higher value GV1 definitive stamp were used through out the Occupation. The other postal service operating during the occupation was the German Feidpost which was for the military forces

Autumn Competitions

Opening the meeting the President reported that in the AEPS Autumn rally the Society had some success The inter societies quiz we won by some 20 marks with a scratch team John Church the President and his wife Anne .Len won the literature prize, John Church was successful in the Aerophilatelic modern material section and the society was third in the Presidents Trophy.

The judges for our the competitions were Ray How and Ken Seamore from Rayleigh PS. In the stamps Gary Green entered a display of early decimal stamps from Great Britain, Chris Cooksey used the 1943 issue of Southern Rhodesian commemorating the 50th anniversary of Matabeleland in singles, block of up to ten stamps and also showed a number of plate flaws and errors. John Pettit used the one penny Universal post of New Zealand for his entry, he showed stamps from all the issues between 1901 and 02 with a strip of six stamps with first day cancels with a FDC from the 1902 issue and included stamps that showed how the printing plates had worn. Chris Cooksey won this competition.

The postal history competition had the most entries, Dennis Sales first entry was of covers and entires of Great Britain prior to 1840 with a variety of town cancels and mileage marks, also included were a number of continental covers from the 18th century. Petworth post an entry from Chris Cooksey was of covers and entires from between 1736 and 1799 covering the five different hand stamps used in this period. Printing office franks from Fiji were Charlie Meads entry and showed them on a number of preprint covers to various Government officials in the islands. Cork and other fancy cancels from the USA on covers from 1884 although many of the stamps were from the 1861 to 70 issues were Arthur Bowles entry.

Chris Cooksey's entry was first but as he won the competition last year the trophy went to Arthur Bowles.

In the Aerophilatelic competition Chris Cooksey entered covers that the Central African Airways had attached stickers for the transporting fee that had Rhodesian stamps on them and covered the period from 1946 to 1964. Early Swiss airmail covers came from Dennis Sales many bearing stamps from the 1923 air issues others had early Swiss pilots on stamps, the entry also had a 1917 cover from Geneva to New York. The 1931 New Zealand Christmas flights were from John Pettit and covered flight from the towns of both islands each town having its own coloured cachet cancel. The postal rate was special for these flights with the three pence stamp of 1931 having a surcharge 5 pence. One of the covers shown was addressed to Westcliff on Sea. This entry not only won John the competition but also won praise from the judges as the way a competition entry should be made.

Meeting Report Members Themes

Charlie Nicholson started the evening off with Stained Glass Windows that took us all over the world with stamps for Christmas and Easter from countries of Africa, The Caribbean and New Zealand also included were stamps from Guernsey and Ireland with a miniature sheet from Zambia commemorating the life of David Livingston.

David Perry followed on with Philatelic Exhibitions with post cards, covers and commemorative labels from a variety of stamp events that included a postcard from the Universal penny post exhibition of 1890 that had a special postmark other items came from South Africa, Jamaica, Luxemburg and the USA, finishing with an item from Brazil from 1938

Pat Harris completed the first session with two short themes, Herm island stamps between 1948 and 1969 the stamps were privately issued by the tenants of the island to transfer mail from there to Guernsey the display included a pigeon post stamp that was used to transfer urgent messages as in 1948 there was no telephones. The other theme was of the Arts as shown on GB stamps and covered all the different Art forms including Theatre, cinema and architecture.

Chris Cooksey was first in the second session with the British South Africa Company stamps of Rhodesia used as Revenue stamps the theme being licences and certificates required for mining operations and displayed many of these from making a claim, yearly inspections to the transferring of claims. Gary Green had Landmarks and Monuments as his theme as shown on GB stamps and miniature sheets

The hyper-inflation time of Germany in 1923 was Alex McGratten theme mainly on covers and took us from early in September with overprints in Thousands right through to November including a cover dated 3/11/23 that had stamps on the front to the value of 52 million Marks and some 48 stamps on the back for 80 million Marks.

Len Stanway completed the evening with the theme of Transport opening with the worlds railways on stamps from most of the

continents and went on to display covers commemorating various railway anniversaries. Locomotives of the world were next and included the German upside down tram and Blackpool's trams and tramways and the coach were the first world war ended. These were followed by the Belgium railway stamps showing the various works carried out by staff. The Display ended with travelling post offices with covers taken to and from cites like York with covers from Irish Railways and finished with a cover from the trans Siberian railway from Russia to China.
